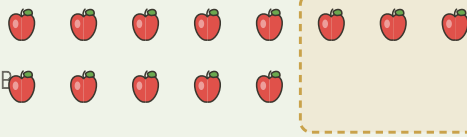
Objective: Compare two groups and find how many more are needed to match.

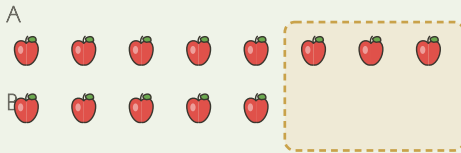

TEACHER NOTES Answer key & guidance

Answers: 571, 296, 169, 74, 615, 243, 468, 249, 685
 Common error: Counting matched objects instead of the gap

Strategy: Match one-to-one, count the unmatched
 Prompt: "Which objects have no partner?"

I solved by: matching groups counting up looking at the rows
