Mixed Operation Stories • Prove

Objective: *Prove the answer by building it back.*

DO THIS Solve. Then check the other way.

PROVE Solve, then build it back.

EXAMPLE $9 + 1 = \underline{10}$
 $10 - 9 = \underline{1}$

SOLVE AND PROVE Solve, then check each one.

1 $4 + 1 = \square$
 $5 - 4 = \square$

2 $2 + 5 = \square$
 $7 - 2 = \square$

3 $8 + 1 = \square$
 $9 - 8 = \square$

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EXAMPLE $9 + 1 = \underline{10}$
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SOLVE AND PROVE Solve, then check each one.

 $5 - 4 = \underline{1}$

2 $2 + 5 = \underline{7}$
 $7 - 2 = \underline{5}$

3 $8 + 1 = \underline{9}$
 $9 - 8 = \underline{1}$
